America's Four Gods – What Every Reform Jew Needs to Know January 2025

The adult education committee has put together a great many courses over the past couple of years. There's only one series that we have offered several times and that is America's Four Gods. The reason is that I believe that every member of our congregation needs to understand this concept and evaluate for themselves which of the four gods they relate to. So we're going to offer America's For God's as one of our two series in February. There will also be a course relating to Israel which will serve as an Introduction to our potential trip to Israel in October.

This is really really important because our religion is based upon God. And yet very few of us have any clear sense of what that might mean to us. We come to our Temple to pray and we open the siddur, but we're not sure what to make of many of the prayers that we read.

Part of the reason for this is that the prayers in our siddur are deliberately "multi vocal". What that means is that the editors of the prayer book realized that they were preparing a composite work for groups that do not share the same theological premises. Therefore they inserted prayers that reflected different viewpoints and indeed sought out prayers that might be interpreted in different manners by the same group.

In my first book, American Reform Judaism an Introduction, I argued that this was a bad thing. All Reform Jews should believe in the same type of God. Only then could you have a coherent religion. But there was no one God that all Reform Jews — or even most Reform Jews — were predisposed to accept.

So I eventually accepted the inevitable - that Reform Judaism needed to embrace theological pluralism. This was difficult for me to accept because I saw that most of the really successful congregations were able to unify under a single belief system and that helped them to motivate virtually all of their members to commit themselves to the religious expectations set out by their movement.

But that's not the reality in most congregations. It's not just in synagogues that members feel differently from each other about the nature of God. It's most American congregations of all religions! and that's where the idea of America's Four Gods comes in.

The expression "America's Four Gods" is based upon a study by two Baylor University sociologists. They studied what Americans believe about God and they found that based on two questions you could divide almost all Americans into one of four categories. In asking dozens of questions about God, they found that two questions pinpoint the most crucial theological disagreements in America. They are:

- 1. Does God interact with the world?
- 2. Does God judge people after they die?

If you know your answers to these 2 broad questions, then you have tremendous insight into your entire worldview. In fact, your responses to these two questions predict the substance of your entire worldview. If you answer yes to both questions, that would put you in the authoritative God category. If you say no to both questions that would put you in the distant God category. If you say yes to the first question and no to the second question then that would put you in the benevolent God category. And if you say no to the first question but yes the second question, that would put you in the critical God category.

Using these two dimensions of belief, the sociologists split the American public into four categories:

- 1. Americans who believe in a God who is both engaged in the world and judgmental—The Authoritative God
- 2. Americans who believe in a God who is engaged, yet non judgmental—The Benevolent God
- 3. Americans who believe in a God who is judgmental, but disengaged—The Critical God
- 4. Americans who believe in a non judgmental and disengaged God—The Distant God

We're going to do another series on America's Four Gods starting at the very beginning of February. We're going to look at all four options and discuss why different types of people gravitate towards specific approaches rather than others. We're not necessarily hoping that you will choose one and commit to that approach but rather we're hoping that the group will grapple with the different belief systems and what that may imply for our "lived religion".

Sign up for the series today! You'll learn a little bit about how you perceive the world and how you understand the concept of God in that world. You'll learn a little bit about yourself and about what it means to you to pray with our congregation in our Temple and possibly to pray on your own.

Hopefully, it'll help you to grow as a person and to develop a stronger and more meaningful relationship with God, however you conceive of God!





NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

Is 'Inner Peace' an idea left over from the flower children proliferation? Actually, its Hebraic development was written extensively over 600 years ago in the *Zohar*. I would like to demystify some basic ideas from this mystical book as they relate to our congregational singing. The book's concealed messages may add new dimensions and insights which will enable us to sing the *Bar'chu* and *Sh'ma* with greater focus and spiritual fulfillment. The *Zohar* is a concise compendium of Jewish esoteric and Kabbalistic faith. If you already have mastered all that, you may choose to skip the rest of this article. Otherwise, please give it a few minutes read.

When a *minyon* (a quorum of ten adult Jews) is present, a summoning is required to commence the communal *Maariv* (service held in the evening). The *Zohar* states that all sacred acts require the assembled people to address God in an appropriate manner. So what would be the first thought we want to convey to the One who gives us everything we are and will be? Logically as well as spiritually, it is this: We **bless** God.


The root of the word *bar'chu* (the Hebrew letters *bet, reish,* and *kaf*) can also form the word *berech* (knee). Through much of recorded history, people would drop to their knees before a monarch, acknowledging his or her sovereignty. To call or bless God, instead of babbling from our self-centered stance in the universe, allows us to become universal transmitters of unconditional respect, trust, and love. Thus, before we can proclaim God's unity with us - and ours with each other, we recognize that the world has not been created through our individual strength and accomplishments, but through *Adonai ham'vorach* understood as ("the Blessed One who is already blessed"). We bow and bless the Blessed One, acknowledging that we are a part of that existence as well; we depend on it, and, accordingly, we praise the Source that makes it so.

Cantor chants, bowing from the opening *bar'chu* and straightening at the *Adonai*: "*Bar'chu et Adonai* ham'vorach. (*Bless God, the Blessed One*).

Congregation responds and repeats: *Baruch Adonai ham'vorach l'olam va-ed*." (Praise Adonai to Whom all praise is due now and forever).

We do not require a *minyan* to recite, or in the best of all possible worlds, **sing** the *Sh'ma*. However, when we, the people Israel, join with others in public, the *Bar'chu* set the stage for the *Sh'ma* to become a communal call: "Listen, Israel!". We then proceed to proclaim in song together that "*Adonai* is our God" and that "*Adonai* is One". To sum it up, first we first bless God and then we do the most miraculous thing, it seems, that anyone can do: we **listen!**

AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM THE TEMPLE

Wearing a Tallit for Honors at Temple Beth Shalom of the West Valley

Members of Temple Beth Shalom – or any other Reform Jewish congregation – are not required to wear a tallit or kippah at any time during religious services, although many of our members do so – especially during the High Holy days. Neither the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) nor the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) require persons who hold or carry a Torah, or who recite the blessing before or after the reading of the Torah or the Haftorah, to wear a tallit.

Dress Code

At the Board meeting of November 17, the Board unanimously passed a dress code for those sitting on the Bimah and carrying the Torah. Honorees should be wearing synagogue appropriate clothing. No shorts will be allowed. Thank you for your cooperation.

When Carrying or Holding a Torah or Reciting a Blessing

TBS provides a tallit rack with tallitot in the lobby just before the entry doors to the sanctuary. These tallitot are available to anyone to borrow for wearing during a service. We just ask that if you borrow one, you fold it and return it to the rack after the service. There is usually a "spare" tallit or two folded up and sitting on the top of a bookshelf along the wall leading to the sanctuary. Any of these can also be borrowed for wearing during a service.

Please let the Rabbi know if you would like to discuss anything related to this matter of wearing a tallit at TBS.

MONDAYS FROM 10 - 11:30 A.M. FEBRUARY 3RD, 10TH & 17TH



The subject matter of this course is based on the book America's Four Gods: What We Say About God -- and What That Says About Us - written by Paul Froese and Christopher Bader. They found that that based on two questions, almost all Americans could be divided into one of four categories. These two questions are:

> To what extent does God interact with the world? To what extend does God judge the world?

Drawing on their study of American religious beliefs today the authors found that regardless of their religious tradition (or lack thereof), Americans worship one of four distinct type of God: benevolent, authoritative, distant or critical.

This course will address why knowing what an individual believes about God is important, and an explanation of the four Gods. Participants will be given the opportunity to complete a questionnaire in complete confidence, which will help each person better understand which of the four Gods they come to closest to believing in. Lastly, we will discuss the impact that ones personal beliefs in one of the four Gods may have in our world today.

Course fee \$20 for members or \$35 for non-members or 1 coupon from TBSWV coupon books. Book of 4 coupons for TBS members is \$65 and a book of 4 coupons for non-members is \$120.


TREE OF LIFE

Sisterhood tzedakah includes support of the Temple Food Bank project fund by collecting donations for food baskets and flower baskets in memory of someone or in celebration of milestones. Money is donated to the Temple operating fund and used for new equipment or repairs. Sisterhood also helps the synagogue pay for our weekly security guard.

Dues are free for your first year as a new Temple member and only \$30 every year thereafter. 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
